It will support the campus's bold vision for the future as we strengthen the student experience, boost student recruitment efforts, and expand the campus's academic program offerings in high-demand fields.

When this new facility opens in the fall of next year (2024), as many as 200 students will be able to live on the Sarasota-Manatee campus for the first time. This will create an enhanced sense of community on campus, and it will also attract new students to the area and help them build a deeper connection to the university.

And the construction of this facility is happening at the same time as another exciting project — the planning and design of a 75,000-square-foot Nursing and STEM building — which will allow the campus to offer new majors; help meet the need for more teaching spaces, clinical labs, and research facilities; and double the size of its nursing program. We have a nursing shortage in our state — and USF is going to help fix it.
